Liverpool First Partnership Priorities

Local Area Agreement: Delivering Sustainable Communities

Local Area Agreements (LAAs) are three-year contracts between central and local government to deliver the priorities of local people in their neighbourhoods.

Liverpool's LAA runs from 2008 to 2011 and aims to improve the quality of life and well being of Liverpool residents, visitors and businesses. The LAA is the responsibility of Liverpool First, the local strategic partnership which brings together representatives from Liverpool City Council, other public sector agencies and the voluntary and community sectors, local businesses, regeneration partnerships and residents' groups.

These are working documents unique to each of the five Neighbourhood Management Areas that have been set up to improve the delivery of services across Liverpool. The aims of Neighbourhood Agreements are to:

- improve local service delivery and the quality of life of residents
- identify areas that need priority action and target problems that need to be addressed
- include a range of performance targets that need to be delivered that also allow us to monitor progress
- allow partners and agencies to identify where they should invest their money to improve the area, and
- identify how partners can work together to deliver better services.

Sustainable Community Strategy

Liverpool's Sustainable Community Strategy outlines a distinctive vision and ambition for the city, based on clearly identified local needs, opportunities and priorities which have been worked up between partners and shared with citizens and communities. The strategy is informed by five core aspirations or drivers;

- **Competitive** on the world stage, with a sustainable business sector and dynamic third sector, supported by a workforce drawn from citizens who have lifelong learning ambition and competitive levels of aptitude and skills
- **Connected**, by high quality transport and communications links to international, national and regional markets, enabling the flow of people, information and goods
- **Distinctive** from our overseas competitors, harnessing the diversity and creativity of our people and cultural fabric

- **Thriving**, with neighbourhoods that are clean, safe and sustainable, offering quality housing and embracing the global challenge of climate change
- **Healthy**, with reduced inequalities, improved wellbeing and opportunities for all to live positive independent lives.

Priority actions within the CYPP will contribute to the delivery of the above.

Corporate Priorities

Corporate Plan 2009/10 to 2011/12 – Improving Outcomes for Liverpool

Liverpool City Council is committed to working in partnership from a basis of sound financial and strategic planning to achieve a thriving international city that can compete on a world stage as a place to live, work and visit.

To do this the City Council will pursue the following three long-term aims - underpinned by ten priority themes reflecting the ambition, challenge and complexity of Liverpool.

Aim 1: Grow the city's economy

- Increase business density and gross value added (GVA) beyond national levels for city regions to deliver an environment which provides opportunity, employment and well-being for our citizens, business and investors.
- Make Liverpool a first choice for investment and growth by working with the private, not for profit and public sectors quickly and effectively with an emphasis on quality of infrastructure.
- Promote enterprise, attract investment through developing the city's co-ordination and offer across the city region to provide scale, connectivity and sustainability of its economy.
- Exploit the city's wider cultural advantage to attract and retain visitors, workers and residents.

Aim 2: Develop our communities

- Provide sustainable communities through access to decent homes and best practice in environment management including, recycling, street cleansing and environmental enforcement against dereliction and environmental detractors.
- Challenge crime and anti-social behaviour safeguarding young people from becoming perpetrators or victims.
- Increase peoples' sense of influence in decisions affecting their lives and communities through open, fair and accountable neighbourhood-driven processes.

Aim 3: Empower our residents

- Ensure safeguarding and inclusion of the most needy and excluded groups in the city providing equality and real opportunity for improvement and enhanced quality of life.
- Confront barriers to employment and training through lack of access, deprivation, discrimination and poor health to ensure provision of a highly skilled workforce.
- Developing first rate education and training from early years and further position Liverpool as a prime destination for postgraduate retention.

Building Schools for the Future

During the 2009/10, the City Council will finalise its plans for implementing Wave 6 of the Building Schools for the Future programme in Liverpool. This will involve:

- The ongoing delivery of Wave 2 schemes
- Consultation with some schools on proposals currently agreed by the City Council's Executive Board
- The securing of relevant planning approvals for prospective schemes
- The assessment of school strategies for change to ensure they embrace the city's transformational learning agendas
- Preparatory work to develop the Local Education Partnership (LEP)
- Submission of the Outline Business Case to Partnerships for Schools in July 2009

This will require significant investment in the BSF team's capacity which will be put in place prior to the financial year 2009/10.
