### RECORDS OF MERCHANT SEAMEN

#### INFORMATION LEAFLET - 14

##### INTRODUCTION

Hundreds of thousands of seamen have come from and passed through the port of Liverpool during its long history. This leaflet deals with how to find out about merchant seamen as opposed to men serving in the Royal Navy [See Leaflet 13 for this] and will give you an idea where to start a search.

These are the main repositories:

##### **NATIONAL ARCHIVES (The Public Record Office)**

There was no systematic registration of seamen before 1835. Many records formerly held by the Registrar General of Shipping & Seamen have been transferred to the National Archives. These include registers of certificates issued to mates (from 1845), engineers (from 1862) and skippers and mates of fishing boats (from 1880).

A series of useful leaflets on merchant seamen can either be seen online at the National Archives website: [www.pro.gov.uk](http://www.pro.gov.uk) or in hardcopy in Liverpool Record Office. These cover such items as crew lists and agreements and registers of service.

##### **GUILDHALL LIBRARY**

Lloyds Captains' Registers give details of the careers of captains and/or mates on those vessels whose voyage details were lodged at Lloyds and cover the years 1869-1947. Earlier information (going back to 1851) is given for those who were still active in 1869. The Guildhall Library in London ([www.ihrinfo.ac.uk](http://www.ihrinfo.ac.uk)) has the best collection of these lists. Liverpool Record Office has **NO** Captains' Registers. Merseyside Maritime Museum (see below) has registers covering 1874-1887.

##### **LIVERPOOL LIBRARIES**

###### **Crew Lists**

Crew lists and agreements were completed for every British vessel before each voyage. The lists include crew names, ages, places of birth and various other details and are useful sources for the history of seamen's careers.

We have a sample of crew lists, 1863-1913, with an alphabetical index of ships' names. A national project to index a sample of these lists by seamen's names called CLIP (Crew List Index Project) has led to a cd-rom being produced which includes references to 269,000 seafarers. A copy is available in the Record Office.

Crew lists are also held by the National Archives (Public Record Office) (10% sample of crew lists and log books), the National Maritime Museum, London and the Maritime History Archive at the Memorial University of Newfoundland, St John's, Newfoundland, Canada.

### **Births and deaths at sea**

We have the General Register Office indexes of Marine Births & Deaths from 1837-1965 on microfiche. The index will only give details of *reported* births and deaths and usually, in the case of deaths, gives the age at death of the deceased and the ship they were sailing on.

### **Archives**

We have some archives relating to seafarers.

These include:

The Indefatigable & National Sea Training School for Boys, 1865-1995 (387 IND). (Please note certain records under a hundred years old are closed under the Data Protection Act. )

## **Liverpool Ships**

In addition to information on seamen the following sources can be used to find information on Liverpool ships:

Liverpool Customs Bills of Entry (Hf 382.05 CUS) : bound in yearly volumes from 1841 to 1880 and then from 1917 to 1939. There is a set on microfilm from 1820, 1825-1837 and 1881-1917. They indicate the goods coming into the port but have no index. The Merseyside Maritime Museum also has a set.

Lloyd's Register of Shipping (387.2058 LLO): give information on where the vessel was built and who owned it. The master or captain is named between 1764 and 1921. From the 1870's the Register has tried to include all merchant vessels over 100 gross tons. Liverpool's set is housed in the Business and Technology Library.

Sea Breezes (Hq 387.205 IND): one of the main shipping periodicals and has a wealth of anecdotal articles about ships and shipping. Indexes have been published to non-military vessels covering the years 1920-1955.

Photographs: The Photographs and Small Prints Collection includes views of ships.

Newspapers: Many of the early Liverpool newspapers were published mainly to give details of shipping movements in and out of Liverpool and are kept on microfilm. These include the Liverpool General Advertiser (1765-1876) and Williamson's Liverpool Advertiser (1756-1856). Both sets are incomplete.
